2010 – Preparatory Football Program for 3 to 5 year old children

Taringa Rovers will be introducing a preparatory football program in 2010. This program is in line with the ‘Football Squirts’ program initiated by Football Queensland and has been created to develop the football skills of 3 to 5 year old children. Prep class will be 45 minutes once a week on Saturday mornings at about 9am – exact time still to be advised.

- This program is all about fun. It is not a technical coaching program, but rather an introduction to football
- The program is for children who are not yet old enough to be registered to play - and offers the opportunity to receive quality coaching
- It is hoped that participating children will acquire basic skills, learn correct technique and develop a love of football
- The very basics of the game will be introduced to the participants through different drills, practices and games.
- The program benefits the individuals general wellbeing through participation in football based exercise and activity
- The program will assist in the development of the individual's gross motor skills by repetition and practice
- Running, stopping, ball control, jumping and turning will improve balance, agility, movement and general co-ordination

What will my child learn from the preparatory program?

- Body coordination
- Hand-Eye and Foot-Eye coordination
- Motor skills development
- Introduction to stretching & exercise
- Fundamentals of the game
- Balance
- How to focus on the fun of the game rather than on winning or losing
- Sportsmanship
- Rules and Regulations
- Respect for others

These skills are all very important and the sooner they are mastered the better for the individual. It is well worth introducing your child to this type of structured, group skills training as early as possible. What they learn will be helpful to them at school and in any sport they choose to play.

The Four Player Groups at Taringa Rovers Football Club

- **Small Sided Football (SSF) (U6–U10)**

What is Small Sided Football?

Small Sided Football (SSF) was previously known as **Rooball**. The term Rooball is now defunct and has been officially replaced with the name Small Sided Football. The concept of Small Sided Football (SSF) was introduced in season 2008 by The FFA (Football Federation Australia). SSF is a modified version of association / club football which has been structured to suitably address the needs of young players. It is important to emphasise that the purpose is skill development through fun. SSF benefits children by making their early contact with the game more enjoyable while simultaneously providing an environment that will facilitate greater skill development.

Small Sided Football (SSF) is non-competitive so there are no official winners or losers. SSF is all about introducing young players to football in an enjoyable and supportive environment. As a club we want to encourage our SSF players to enjoy playing with their friends while developing a sense of team spirit and responsibility.

- **Junior Competitive (U11 to U16)**

In our junior competitive teams we aim to provide an environment in which players can further develop their skills and are encouraged to play to their full potential. Players and then teams are graded according to skills and commitment levels.

- **Senior Men (includes the U18 Youth competition)**

- **Senior Women**

Additional Training

Academy Squads

Taringa Rovers also has three assessment based Academy Squads (U10, U11), (U12, U13, U14), (U15 & up). The academy squad members are assessed and selected on the basis of their football skills and commitment. Twice each year there will be an opportunity to trial and be assessed for possible entry into an academy squad. Outside of these assessment periods a player may be individually identified by the club as having outstanding potential and may be invited to join an academy squad.

Training Workshops

Additional training workshops are available to all age groups throughout the year and are for players who would like to enhance their football skills. These workshops can be designed to meet the specific training needs of a particular team or group.



Field Use

TRFC would like to thank the Brisbane City Council for the recent refurbishment of the main field. Just after the end of the senior season 2009 the entire field surface was removed, laser levelled and re-laid.

With a membership as large as we have at Taringa Rovers it is very difficult to avoid over use of our fields. We ask for your understanding and help in keeping the wear and damage to a minimum.

As much as we enjoy a family atmosphere at training and on game days – and as much as we understand that your pets are a part of your family, please remember that Taringa Rovers is not an off leash area at any time. Please keep your pets with you and please do not ever allow them to amuse themselves by digging at the fields while waiting for you.

To protect the quality of our new playing surface the club has appointed a fulltime Field Manager who will permanently oversee and maintain the fields and amenities.

Please remember that Field 1 is for fixture football only. We request that everyone stays off the main field at all times unless authorised to be there by the Club President (Wayne Diaz) or the Field Manager (Rob Kirby).

Behaviour Management Policy

Taringa Rovers has a Behaviour Management Policy that is based on the model provided by the **Queensland Department of Sport and Recreation**. This policy details the roles and responsibilities of parents, participants, coaches and officials. All parents / guardians are required to read this policy before signing the **True Sport Lives Here Code of Ethics** form that is to be completed and provided at registration. More information about the True Sport Code of Ethics can be found on the TRFC website.

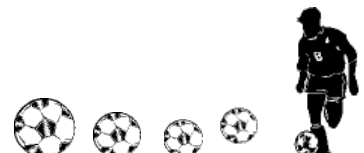
Taringa Rovers asks all players to display a responsible attitude to training and playing, to show respect to coaches and managers by attending all training sessions and matches and to cooperate positively at all times. Players should also note that they are required to notify their manager or coach prior to being absent from a match or training session, so that replacement players can be found if needed.

Lastly, we ask parents to exhibit responsible sideline behaviour. We also ask all parents to be respectful and supportive of the coaches, managers, officials, players and spectators. If an issue should arise concerning your child we encourage you to discuss the issue directly with the coach or manager who is working with the team. If the issue cannot be resolved at this level please contact the Junior Coordinator allocated to your player's age group. Referees should not be subjected to abuse of any kind and should not be approached by parents during or after a match.

Any queries should be directed to your Junior Coordinator or other club official present on the day and any complaints should be emailed directly to the club President (Wayne Diaz) president@taringarovers.com.au.

In summary. Parents & Guardians are requested to:

- **provide a supportive and encouraging environment so all players may enjoy learning to play football**
- **model great sportsmanship & appropriate behaviour at all times**
- **support your team manager and coach by taking note of all information provided by them, responding promptly to their requests and notifying them of absences from training and games**



Equipment & Uniform

Players are required to wear the correct Taringa Rovers uniform. Compulsory items are the club shirt, shorts and socks which are available for purchase from the club at sign on and throughout the year. Players must wear football boots and shin pads. The club provides all players with their playing jersey, which remains the property of the club. TRFC will also supply all team coaches with enough balls and equipment for training purposes. However, if you would like to purchase a ball for your child to practice at home please use the following as a guide to the correct size:

- **Under 6 to U9 size 3 ball**
- **Under 10 to U13 size 4 ball**
- **Under 14 and up size 5 ball**

Please make sure you clearly name all football clothing and equipment you purchase for your child. It is the only way we are able to find you should any of your belongings find their way into lost property.

Wet Weather

Team Photographs & Trophies / Medallions

Team photos will be taken in the clubhouse over two days, Saturday 17th and Sunday 18th July 2010. Each registered player will receive one laminated copy of their team photograph. Additional copies can be ordered at an additional cost.

Trophies and medallions will be given out at the end of the junior playing season – dates to be advised. There will be no additional charge to you as the cost of these is included in registration.



Registration and Placement of Players in Teams

It is a requirement of Football Brisbane that a child must have turned five years of age to qualify for team registration. Only registered players are covered by insurance and eligible to participate in training and matches. A copy of the player's birth certificate is required when registering.

The policy of the club is to accept all returning players at sign on. If however, we find ourselves in a situation where we have insufficient numbers to fill a team, we will endeavour to form a team by making a composite age group team. If however, we still are unable to fill a team, we will seek to negotiate with nearby clubs to try and place all players in teams.

The club does not field junior all girl teams at this stage, however, depending on numbers, groups of girls will be kept together when possible. If at any stage we have enough girls to form a team then an all girls team may be considered.

The age group a player will play in is determined by the oldest age the child will be in the calendar year in which they play – eg a child that turns 10 during 2010 will play in U10 during that year.

Club Fees

Taringa Rovers F C aims to keep registration fees reasonable, but as costs associated with operating the club increase so will the cost of registration. Please note that at Taringa Rovers, all playing costs are included in the registration fee. Parents will not be continually paying for match fees or referee fees throughout the season.

How to get reduced or free registration:

When calculating fees for sibling registration discounts, the system works as follows:
The oldest player in the family is the '1st child', the second oldest is added from the 2nd player column and the third oldest is added from the 3rd child column. Should there be more than three players in one family, the fourth child onwards will be added from the 3rd child column.

Refund Policy

Refund of fees will be made on the following basis:

- When notification to withdraw from the club is received within two weeks of the junior sign on day the refund will be the registration amount minus a \$30 per player club administration fee.
- When notification to withdraw from the club is received more than two weeks after the junior sign on day but prior to the commencement of official fixtures, the refund will be the registration amount minus a \$30 per player club administration fee and \$60 per player for Football Brisbane fees.
- When notification to withdraw from the club is received after official fixtures have commenced, a refund may only be given in the case of a season ending injury or other extraordinary circumstance. Any refund after official fixtures have commenced will be at the discretion of the Taringa Rovers Football Club Management Committee.

Volunteer Levy

There are many tasks that must be done in order for a club of this size to function smoothly. In times gone by, most of these tasks would have been evenly distributed amongst the club's families. In today's busy world, most families are just too busy to be able to offer their time to help, even if they would like to. This means the entire work load is piled onto the same few people over and over again. It is just not practicable in the long run for a club to 'burn out' its volunteers and so in 2009 Taringa Rovers Football Club introduced a volunteer levy of \$80 per family.

The levy system works as follows:

- Volunteer levy of \$80 per family is paid with registration at sign on
- The levy is redeemable by giving 8 hours of work time to the club before or during the football season
- Coaching / Managing a team constitutes a full volunteer levy contribution and as such will entitle the coach / manager to a refund or rollover of their levy at season end. It is important to note that the coach / manager must be actively involved in that role for the entire season to qualify for levy redemption. This applies to one coach and one manager per team only. In situations where teams load share between multiple coaches and managers it will still apply to one coach and one manager only. Any division of levy monies redeemed will need to be done internally by the team involved after payment from the club



- Volunteer time includes duties such as working bees, merchandise sales, canteen, BBQ etc
- We are always interested in discussing any other skills you have that may be useful to the club – your particular skill could be your volunteer contribution, eg professional or trade skills, organisation of fundraising etc
- The levy redemptions are processed at the end of the 2010 football season
- You may choose to have your levy redemption as a cheque payment or a rollover for the next season. Some families choose to donate it back to the club – this option is of course always appreciated.
- No part payments will be made. Levy repayments are only for members who have completed eight hours of volunteer time in the current season. Similarly, there are no part rollovers to the next season

Exemptions - Volunteer Levy

In certain cases, an exemption from the volunteer levy is offered. Generally this is in recognition of long term or outstanding service to the club. These exemptions are at the club's discretion.

TRFC Responsibility - Volunteer Levy

The club must make available the opportunity to participate in volunteer events that will make levy redemption possible for anyone who would like to do so.

Member Responsibility - Volunteer levy

The club secretary keeps the Volunteer Levy records. When a club member has performed any volunteer work time that should be recorded for levy redemption, the member must notify the club secretary, secretary@taringarovers.com.au. The secretary will then confirm the hours with the club official involved. Please note: If you do not report your volunteer time to the secretary the hours may not be recorded.

All volunteer levy queries should be sent to the club secretary.

Fundraising

In 2010 TRFC will be working towards the following:

- **shade structure over the grandstand (stage 1)**
- **new canteen (stage 2)**
- **new amenities block (stage 3)**

In 2009 the club received a grant that will go towards the cost of building stage 1. The aim of the Club in 2010 is to raise funds to help with completion of stage 2 and stage 3. There will be a number of fundraising activities throughout the season and we encourage all families to support the fundraising efforts as this enables the club to continue to provide improvements that will benefit the community.

[Small Sided Football \(SSF\)](#)

Small Sided Football is a term given to a modified football game designed to foster development of young players in the U6 to U10 age group. This game has been recommended by Football Federation Australia (FFA) and follows the guidelines of the National Junior Sport Policy written by the Australian Government. It is the policy of the Club that all SSF players have equal amounts of time on the field, unless otherwise requested by the parents of the player.

[Non Graded Teams Small Sided Football \(SSF\) Under 6, 7, 8](#)

Players in U6, U7 and U8 are non-graded according to FFA rules. Parents will be emailed in the last week of February informing them of their child's team, coach, manager and training details.

Taringa Rovers offers an in-house competition in the U6, U7 and U8 age groups – a 'round robin' format, with all games played at home. All age groups are separate as motor skills and physical size vary significantly in these age groups. As there is no grading in these age groups - the players are placed in teams according to social groups. Apart from the obvious advantages of physical activity, it is important that young players enjoy football at this early age. This is a game which helps to develop self-confidence, co-operation and concentration skills.

[Soft Graded Teams Small Sided Football \(SSF\) Under 9 & 10](#)

Players in U9 and U10 will participate in a form of 'soft grading' introduced by Football Queensland in 2009 to enable similarly skilled teams to play against each other. This soft grading is usually team based with the possible movement of some players. This usually involves assessing the individual skills of a player for appropriate team placement.

Taringa Rovers participates in a non in house competition in the U9 and U10 age groups. This means some travel will be involved but is usually restricted to the western suburbs. Fixtures are coordinated by Football Brisbane and will be available through your team manager and on the Football Brisbane website.

U9 teams were introduced to SSF in 2009 and 2010 will see U10 also playing this format. Further information on small sided Football (SSF) can be found on the Taringa Rovers website or on www.footballaustralia.com.au (FFA website).

Competitive Junior Football

Australian National Junior Sport Policy

“Competition is an intrinsic part of sport that involves measuring performance against an opponent, oneself, or the environment. Competition provides stimulation and challenge as well as the opportunity to apply, test and further develop skills in a game situation. Properly managed, competition should be seen as a healthy and desirable part of sport.

Within Australian society, competition is closely associated with success and failure. Junior sport participants should be taught that ‘winning’ and ‘losing’ are merely results of all sporting competition. There should not be an over-emphasis on winning in junior sport as this can lead to dissatisfaction with sport in general.

Competition is also a test of ability and potential, with the pursuit of excellence as desirable in junior sport as in other forms of endeavour. All junior sport participants should be encouraged to achieve, do their best, and develop their full sporting potential. Challenging competition is one element of this development process.”

Graded Teams, Competitive Juniors, U11 to U16

Players from U11 to U16 will participate in grading. Three pre-season grading days in February are planned for all competitive age groups from Under 11 to U16. This will help assess not only which team each player is best suited to, but will also determine the divisions that teams will be nominated for in the grading games that begin on the last weekend of March. There are normally 3 – 4 grading games and during this time players will continue to be assessed and players may float between teams at this stage. Once grading is completed, teams will be established and players will commence training as a team. It is essential that all players in those age groups attend all pre-season grading sessions and games.

When grading competitive teams into divisions, TRFC will always endeavour to place teams in the highest division possible according to the skills of the players in that team.

The coaches in these age groups will give game instructions; these instructions may be different from one game to the next depending on which opposition the team is playing. It is important for a parent not to give game instructions to their children as this could conflict with the coach’s instructions, causing confusion with the player. Remember that coaches look for players who can follow instructions.

As Taringa Rovers is one of the few Brisbane clubs with Premier League status, the club receives a number of players each year from other clubs so positions become competitive.

Under 11 & 12

Taringa Rovers policy in these age groups is to attract experienced coaches with the ability to quickly organise a team and communicate game tactics to the players. It is important that these coaches have experience in grading teams into divisions so the teams are correctly graded within the Football Brisbane Incorporated (FBI) competition.

It is the policy of the club that the Junior Director of Coaching and the Division 1 coach for that age group control the full age group until they decide to break the group into teams. Taringa Rovers attempts to break the ‘parent cycle’ at the Under 11 age group by appointing coaches with qualifications and / or experience who have no children in the age group. This of course is not always possible.



Under 13, 14 & 15

By this age group most junior players are very committed to football and this is the time when attitude and ability become important ingredients in determining the progression of a talented player. TRFC understands that school sport is also very important to children but it should be noted that the school football season is only 8 to 10 weeks long so it is possible to play both. In 2010 TRFC will field BJJ teams in the U13 and U15 age groups.

Under 16 & 18 (Youth)

U16 is the final year that girls can play in the mixed competition. At this age the girls can now play in Senior Women's teams. Selection into 1st women's team is extremely competitive and selection is based on how far the player is likely to progress.

U18 (Youth) is part of the Football Brisbane Senior competition and is overseen by the senior coaching staff. Pre-season training / trials last for six - eight weeks where the emphasis is on fitness. Players will do their pre-season training with the senior teams.

U16 players may have the opportunity to play senior football, however this action always needs to comply with FFA rules (eg, 'number of games played up etc).

Grading Guidelines

The following guidelines have been developed for players, parents and coaches to inform them of the grading policies of the club. We hope this information will help explain the sometimes difficult task that coaches and administrators have. The policies of Taringa Rovers are designed around the club philosophy of developing players to their full potential.

Our club takes pride in the fact that we provide a pathway for talented juniors to the State and National Football Leagues. We also take pride in the fact that Taringa Rovers provides a broad social environment for young players who wish to participate at every level from Preparatory Football for 3 to 5 year old children and then from Under 6's to senior men's (including Over 35's) and senior women's football.

We ask that you trust our ability and honesty in selections.

The word grading is used in reference to:

- Placement of players into 'like skilled' groups
- Registering Taringa teams into Divisions offered by Football Brisbane Incorporated (FBI)

Grading takes place over a very short period of time. Parents can help by encouraging players and their friends to register early (official junior sign on weekend) and by having players attend all grading sessions.

It is the policy of this Club to re-grade players every year, so every junior player has the opportunity to progress.

It is important to note that juniors differ in their ability to acquire skills and move through the various stages of development. The Club encourages parents and players not to focus on which team a player is in, rather on the player's own soccer development. Each age group will have a Director of Coaching who along with the coaches in the age group will decide on player placement. In competitive age groups, the coaches may wish to keep training with several more players than the team requires until final selections are made.



The aim of the club is to grade the players as fairly as possible. Some parents place undue pressure on their children by expecting them to always be in the top team. We suggest that parents help their children through the grading process by being supportive.

In all cases of team / player selection the club's decision is final.

In the competitive teams players are placed in teams on the basis of their playing ability. Unfortunately, issues such as friendship and shared transport cannot be taken into account. If you have any concerns about the outcome of the grading process please discuss the situation with the Director of Coaching for the age group.

Training Schedule 2010

Joe Fenech is a very experienced coach and holds a UEFA A coaching licence so this is a great opportunity for our junior coaches to learn from one of the best.

These specific training exercises will be done at the beginning of each training session leaving enough time for coaches to include their own ideas and creativity. All coaches will be taken through training drills prior to the start of the training season.

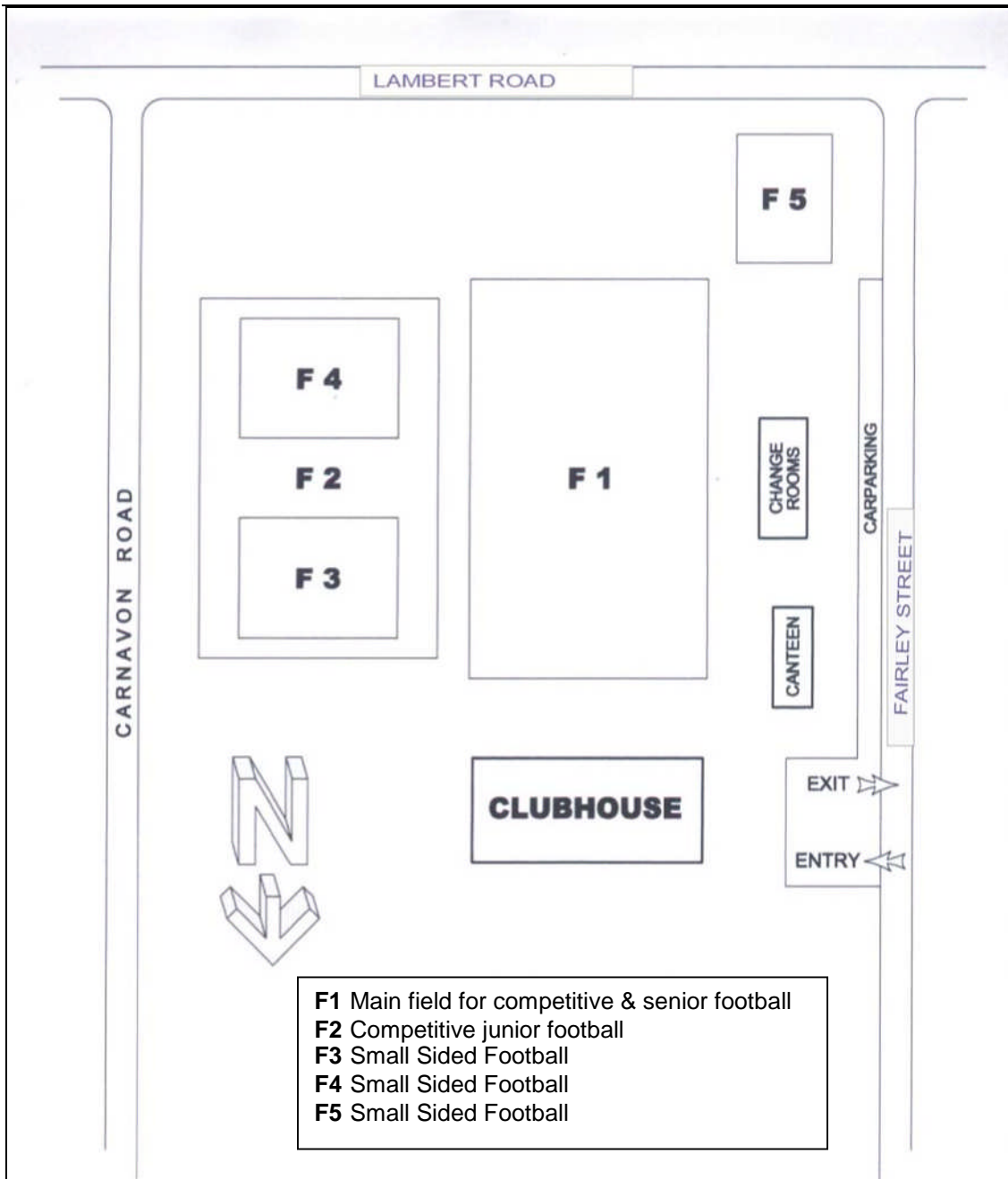
